A SCOUT IS COURAGEOUS



Michael Swisher, battling cerebral palsy, didn't take an easy route to the honor of Eagle Scout. By Tabatha Hunter

BENTONVILLE — When Michael Swisher was diagnosed with cerebral palsy, his family knew things were going to be different and difficult.

His parents understood that the disease affecting the portions of the brain that control movement meant their son would be confined to a wheelchair and would likely be unable to do many of the things his older brother, Daniel, enjoyed.

Still, Swisher's parents, Gail and Brian Swisher, didn't let the diagnosis stop Michael, 18, from doing anything he wanted to do, including joining the Boy Scouts.

On Monday night, Swisher's family and friends gathered at St. Stephen Catholic Church in Bentonville to watch as Swisher was awarded his Eagle Scout badge.

"This was not an easy route. Michael had to meet all the same requirements (for the Eagle Scout badge) as everyone

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else,” Brian Swisher said.

Only four out of every 100 boys who enter Boy Scouts will become Eagle Scouts, said Galen Thiele, assistant scoutmaster of Troop 525. Thiele noted that the Boy Scouts don’t keep statistics on the number of boys with disabilities who achieve the rank of Eagle Scout.

“Here, (the Scouts) are all equal,” Brian Swisher said.

To obtain the rank of Eagle Scout, Michael Swisher has obtained 36 merit badges over the 10 years he has been a Boy Scout, including badges in auto mechanics, computers, landscape architecture, archery, horsemanship and rifle shooting.

Swisher’s Eagle Scout project involved 36 other Scouts. Together, the group spent 343 hours designing and building a pavilion for Camp Barnabas, a camp for children with disabilities in Purdy, Mo. The group also cleared a 1/4-mile trail and made it wheelchair accessible.

“It was not very hard,” Swisher said of obtaining his Eagle Scout rank.

Showing pictures of Swisher participating in various scouting activities, John Baker, Swisher’s Cub Scout leader, recalled Swisher’s time in his pack as an inspiration.

“Everything you have done has inspired me, and I have been saying, ‘Go, Mike, go,’ and now that you have done it, my heart is just so full that I cannot hardly hold it,” Baker said.

Swisher’s Eagle Scout award can be considered a tribute to his hard work and determination, as well to the community as a whole, said Keith Vire of the Arkansas Support Network. Swisher has been a client at the Arkansas Support Network for the last 16 years.

“It is a tribute to this community and to this troop. A lot of people talk about being open and accepting, but these people do not talk about it; they do it,” Vire said of Troop 525. “One of the things I love about these folks is nothing is given. He earned this; it is not one of those pretend things.”

After Swisher’s mother pinned his Eagle Scout medal on him and his father presented him with an Eagle Scout badge and certificate, Swisher thanked everyone for helping him on his journey.

Michael Swisher, 18, of Bentonville sat with his dad, Brian, before Michael was awarded his Eagle Scout badge at St. Stephen Catholic Church in Bentonville on Monday night. Michael was diagnosed with cerebral palsy when he was a baby, and though he has spent his life confined to a wheelchair, he was able to earn his Eagle Scout rank.

Both Michael and Brian Swisher are members of the St. Stephen Knights of Columbus Council 12458.

Congratulations to the 77 Brother Knights who completed their 2nd/3rd Degree in Conway on September 13th and entered into full Knighthood. Also, congratulations to the newly reactivated Fort Smith 2nd/3rd Team who did an outstanding job in conferring the degrees. UPCOMING "PERSONS WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES DRIVE"

At a fundraising dinner for a school that serves children with learning disabilities, the father of one of the students delivered a speech that would never be forgotten by all who attended. After extolling the school and its dedicated staff, he offered a question: 'When not interfered with by outside influences, everything nature does, is done with perfection. Yet my son, Shay, cannot learn things as other children do. He cannot understand things as other children do. Where is the natural order of things in my son?' The audience was stilled by the query.

The father continued. 'I believe that when a child like Shay, who was mentally and physically disabled comes into the world, an opportunity to realize true human nature presents itself, and it comes in the way other people treat that child.' Then he told the following story:

Shay and I had walked past a park where some boys Shay knew were playing baseball. Shay asked, 'Do you think they'll let me play?' I knew that most of the boys would not want someone like Shay on their team, but as a father I also understood that if my son were allowed to play, it would give him a much-needed sense of belonging and some confidence to be accepted by others in spite of his handicaps.

I approached one of the boys on the field and asked (not expecting much) if Shay could play. The boy looked around for guidance and said, 'We're losing by six runs and the game is in the eighth inning. I guess he can be on our team and we'll try to put him in to bat in the ninth inning.'

Shay struggled over to the team's bench and, with a broad smile, put on a team shirt. I watched with a small tear in my eye and warmth in my heart. The boys saw my joy at my son being accepted.

In the bottom of the eighth inning, Shay's team scored a few runs but was still behind by three. In the top of the ninth inning, Shay put on a glove and played in the right field. Even though no hits came his way, he was obviously ecstatic just to be in the game and on the field, grinning from ear to ear as I waved to him from the stands.

In the bottom of the ninth inning, Shay's team scored again. Now, with two outs and the bases loaded, the potential winning run was on base and Shay was scheduled to be next at bat.

At this juncture, do they let Shay bat and give away their chance to win the game? Surprisingly, Shay was given the bat. Everyone knew that a hit was all but impossible because Shay didn't even know how to hold the bat properly, much less connect with the ball.

However, as Shay stepped up to the plate, the pitcher, recognizing that the other team was putting winning aside for this moment in Shay's life, moved in a few steps to lob the ball in softly so Shay could at least make contact...

The first pitch came and Shay swung clumsily and missed. The pitcher again took a few steps forward to toss the ball softly towards Shay. As the pitch came in, Shay swung at the ball and hit a slow ground ball right back to the pitcher.

The game would now be over. The pitcher picked up the soft grounder and could have easily thrown the ball to the first baseman. Shay would have been out and that would have been the end of the game.

Instead, the pitcher threw the ball right over the first baseman's head, out of reach of all team mates. Everyone from the stands and both teams started yelling, 'Shay, run to first!'

Run to first!'Never in his life had Shay ever run that far, but he made it to first base. He scampered down the baseline, wide-eyed and startled.

Everyone yelled, 'Run to second, run to second!' Catching his breath, Shay awkwardly ran towards second, gleaming and struggling to make it to the base. By the time Shay rounded towards second base, the right fielder had the ball the smallest guy on their team who now had his first chance to be the hero for his team.

He could have thrown the ball to the second-baseman for the tag, but he understood the pitcher's intentions so he, too, intentionally threw the ball high and far over the third-baseman's head.

Shay ran toward third base deliriously as the runners ahead of him circled the bases toward home.

All were screaming, 'Shay, Shay, Shay, all the Way Shay'

Shay reached third base because the opposing short stop ran to help him by turning him in the direction of third base, and shouted, 'Run to third!'

Shay, run to third!'

As Shay rounded third, the boys from both teams, and the spectators, were on their feet screaming, 'Shay, run home! Run home!'

Shay ran to home, stepped on the plate, and was cheered as the hero who hit the grand slam and won the game for his team

'That day', said the father softly with tears now rolling down his face, 'the boys from both teams helped bring a piece of true love and humanity into this world'.

Shay didn't make it to another summer. He died that winter, having never forgotten being the hero and making me so happy and coming home and seeing his Mother tearfully embrace her little hero of the day!

We all send thousands of jokes through the e-mail without a second thought, but when it comes to sending messages about life choices, people hesitate.

PROGRAM FOR PEOPLE WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES

Time passes with the speed of a lightning bolt! October is upon us. The summer season is past, and the fall activities are underway. The fond memories of this last summer will be stored in our recollections and catalogued for future reference. However, as time goes on, certain memories will remain strong, while others will recede, soon to fall unnoticed from our consciousness, forever lost to us.

All things pass, except God's love for us. Love and kindness is the lifeblood that flows through the generations of humanity. God's love and the kindness and charity that flow from it are eternal. We can be conduits of this force of love and charity. The charity that we direct to our fellow man will exist long after we are gone. It takes on a life of its own as it passes through time. We won't see this future charity, we're not supposed to. An act of kindness to a person, can lift that person, improve and make him feel better about himself and others, he will eventually, in some form, subsequently pass that kindness on to others. Those others will be conduits continuing the circuitry of kindness through the generations.

The Program for People with Intellectual Disabilities constitutes one of our many annual attempts at this charity. It is so tremendously important to many. Not long ago, I overheard a conversation at a community organization conducted between a tutor and a person far less intellectually gifted than us. The young woman was explaining to the tutor her motivations to learn the simple task of counting money and making correct change. She said, "I am so very tired of people making fun of me for not knowin' how to count money. The laughing hurts." This young woman is one of the many we can help by conducting the Disabilities Drive and directing its proceeds to specific organizations within our communities.

The annual People with Intellectual Disabilities Drive is scheduled for October 12th through the 18th, 2009.

It's not too late to plan and enact an activity. October is the customary target month of the Knights of Columbus for this Program for People with Intellectual Disabilities. While this program is often referred to as the "Tootsie Roll Drive", a funds solicitation approach using candy is only one of many different strategies to accomplish the charitable goal. A Council may choose whatever fundraising method deemed most effective in their area. The program can take the form of a spaghetti dinner, silent auction, diner dance or whatever approaches the Council is best suited to pursue.

The success of this noteworthy and worthwhile charitable endeavor depends on your involvement. I pray you can find the time to participate, that your efforts are successful and that the hearts of all involved are lightened with the joy which comes from helping others.

Who benefits from the program? A portion (15%) of the funds collected is directed to the ARC summer camp. This performing arts summer camp serves the disabled by structured classes in everything from music to cooking helping create self-confidence and self-esteem in all who participate. Of course, the charities designated in the individual Council's immediate community continue to receive the bulk (85%) of the net proceeds.

Insurance coverage for the event will be in effect encompassing a three month period, October through December. The target dates selected for the Drive are October 12th through the 18th. The Councils are allowed flexibility in choosing the dates for their drives. Noteworthy is that if a Council intends to conduct the drive on date(s) outside of this targeted timeframe, please advise me, as for underwriting purposes, the insurance company requires this information.

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH

Before we get into listing all the October pro life activities, I want to talk a little bit about how proud I am to be a part of the Arkansas Knights of Columbus. We have delivered our first ultrasound machine to St. Joseph's Helpers in Little Rock. They are so grateful, words cannot express it. They thanked us at the Respect Life conference at St. John's, with our Bishop and our State Deputy in attendance. They thanked us again at the Fr. Pavone brunch at the Cathedral of St. Andrew and they want to thank us again at their annual fund raising dinner on October 27th. St. Joseph's Helpers are really, really grateful to Arkansas Knights of Columbus for the new ultrasound machine. They will use it to help women and save lives.

The Respect Life conference with Fr. Pavone was amazing. Once again, I'm so proud that the Arkansas Knights of Columbus supports the Diocese of Little Rock Respect Life office to make this conference possible. The primary message from Fr. Pavone is that we have won the battle against the evil of abortion. Firstly we have won the battle through the blood of Jesus Christ who gained victory over death by His resurrection and forgiveness for our sins. Fr. Pavone went on to explain that we would see the end of abortion in our life time. This is not some distant dream that our children or grandchildren will have to finish for us. **The victory is at hand.** Women by the thousands are coming forward and testifying to the fact that abortion is not 'good for women' as the pro aborts say. Abortion hurts women and the truth is coming out louder and clearer every day. No one ever changes from Pro Life to Pro Abortion.
